What Must I Believe and What Does it Mean to "Believe"?

The two most important theological words are "Salvation" and "Faith". The two go together but often we are not clear on either of their meaning. For John, when one <u>believes</u> he or she receives <u>eternal life (Et. Salvation)</u> Jo.1:12, 2;23, 5:24, 6:40,48 20:30-31. What does faith mean?

I. The Terms for Faith

Noun-Pistis Faith, Trust, Verb – Pisteuo Believe, Persuaded, Rely Upon, Allegiance (Commit? Surrender?)

Does the word imply obedience, total allegiance, reliance or total commitment? If yes, then how much is enough? What is total commitment? How would you know if you have it?

(But what if faith is not active or fully active? How much inactivity can there be and still have faith? How little activity invalidates faith?)

2. The Continuation Argument

Saving faith is in the present tense and is always continual. (But what about Peter, Solomon, David, Israel, me?)

- * Faith with certain syntactical relationships is saving Present tense and active voice or in a participle form
- * Faith with certain prepositions is saving Believe "in" εν or εις Believe "that" οτι
